Questions for Cantos I, II, and III

Many questions have a right or wrong answer that can be found through careful re-reading or looking at the notes at the end of the chapter. Other questions are open to interpretation and discussion.

- 1. Canto I, line 118
 - a. Why can't Virgil lead Dante into Heaven? (comprehension question, check notes!)
 - b. If Virgil represents human reason, what does this passage suggest about what it takes to get into "Heaven"? (interpretation question; "Heaven" is in quotation marks to remind people that it is an idea subject to many interpretations, not just the traditional religious one)
- 2. Canto II, lines 13 to 15
 - a. What are these three lines talking about?
 - b. Who is "you" (13)?
 - c. Who is the "father of Sylvius" (13)?
 - d. What does it mean to "still/ [be] in corruptible flesh"?
 - i. Why is that flesh "corruptible"?
 - ii. What is the connection between the words *incarnate*, *reincarnated*, and *chili con carne*? (Don't be afraid to use a dictionary)
 - e. When did the father of Sylvius "cross with mortal sense the immortal sill?" (hint—unlike most people now living in the modern world, you actually do know the answer to this question)
- 3. Canto II, lines 51 to 74
 - a. Who is the "Lady" in line 52?

	b. Who is the "Mantuan whose melodies/live in the earth's memory" (58)? (hint—"the earth's memory" is <i>you</i> : do you remember the melody?)
	c. Who is "my dearest friend"?
	d. What does the answer to A ask the answer to B do for the answer to C?
4.	Canto III, line 1 – Who (or what) is "I"?
5.	Canto III, line 23 – How does the detail of Hell's sky being "starless" add to the sense that all who reside there are forever lost?
6.	Canto III, lines 31 to 66 a. What appears to be the crime of the "souls" mentioned in line 31?
	b. What is the connection between these "souls" and the "corps/of angels" who didn't take a side in the war between God and Satan? (Satan, then called Lucifer, was the highest angel in Heaven until he rebelled against God. He lost the ensuing battle and was thrown down into Hell with all those who had joined in his rebellion — by some accounts a third of all the angels.)
	c. Do you think the punishment for these souls fits the crime? How or why/ how not and why not?
7.	Canto III, line 80 – Who is the "old man with a blush of white hair"?
8.	Canto III, lines 100 to 126 a. Do you think that the souls of the damned curse their fate because they have been sent to Hell, or do you think they have been sent to Hell because they cursed their fate?
	b. What simile does Dante use to describe the souls of the damned passing over into Hell?

- 12. Canto IV, lines 119 to 144 List five of the "master souls of time" (119) that Dante meets in Limbo whom you recognize from your studies this year in 10X class.


